

We are pleased to offer to our readers the chance to own one of the greatest pieces of American history to ever come to market. The Beckham Collection is anchored by an extraordinary artifact: an original, battle-worn 48-star U.S. flag flown on the USS YMS-381 minesweeper during the D-Day invasion of Normandy.

This flag, the earliest known Allied flags to surface from D-Day and only verifiable minesweeper flag from D-Day, it is unmatched in its historical significance. Its provenance is meticulously documented, including customs records and a shipping label tracing its journey from the Normandy beaches to the United States in September 1944, when Lt. Commander William Beckham Jr. sent it home. Preserved in exceptional condition, this artifact represents not just a flag but a symbol of unparalleled bravery and precision during the greatest amphibious assault in history.

The historical importance of this flag cannot be overstated. Unlike the more prominent vessels of the invasion fleet, minesweepers like the USS YMS-381 operated on the razor's edge, leading the charge into enemy waters to clear the way for the main assault forces. Beckham and his crew were among the first to confront the heavily fortified shores of Utah Beach, navigating treacherous seas laden with mines and under the constant threat of enemy fire. The flag that flew aboard his vessel was likely one of the very first flags seen by the Germans on that pivotal day, serving as a rare testament to their courage, dedication, and critical role in securing the success of Operation Neptune.



What elevates this historical flag further is its unimpeachable authenticity. Unlike many other D-Day flags, whose provenance often relies on anecdotal evidence or incomplete documentation, this flag's origins are conclusively verified. It is not merely a flag but an irreplaceable piece of military history, encapsulating the heroism, sacrifice, and meticulous strategy that defined one of humanity's most significant turning points.

A Noble Fragment

The mere mention of the Gutenberg Bible, originally published in 1455 by the inventor of the printing press, Johannes Gutenberg, inspires reverence in the heart of every aficionado of great literature and revolutionary Western bookmaking techniques.

A beacon of printmaking prowess and precursor of the Renaissance and Age of Enlightenment, The Gutenberg Bible last appeared in its entirety in October of 1987 at Christie's Auction House, where it sold for \$5.4 million. There are no other known copies in the hands of private collectors, which makes this Gutenberg Leaf, one of the legendary "Noble Fragments", parcelled off and sold by New York rare bookseller Gabriel Wells in the 1920's, a particularly stunning acquisition for the serious collector.

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The Gutenberg Bible, a masterpiece of innovation by Johann Gutenberg and Johann Fust, forever transformed how knowledge was shared across the world.

Nearly all surviving copies are now housed in major institutions, with ten proudly held in the United States, including the Library of Congress and the Morgan Library.

This "Noble Fragment" is one of the rarest documents to enter the collectible book market in the last 40 years.







From the personal collection of renowned American calligrapher and designer, Ray DeBoll comes this fascinating keepsake that links two of Ireland's most impressive literary minds, Samuel Beckett of Waiting for Godot fame and James Joyce, author of the widely revered novels, Homer's Odyssey-inspired Ulysses (featured here) and A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man, which features Stephen Dedalus, a central character in Ulysses. Admirers of Irish ingenuity and modernist literature alike will delight in the whimsical inscription that precedes Beckett's signature.

Ulysses is a shining example of the modernist literary movement that transformed the way writers of the late 19th and early 20th century, and their literary successors, captured on paper the complex thought processes that make all humans unique and yet kindred. James Joyce expertly, and humorously, employs a stream-of-consciousness style throughout his masterpiece, Ulysses, to reveal the inner monologues of his richly-developed cast of three characters as they go about their business one fateful summer day (June 16th, 1904) in Dublin, Ireland, Joyce's native land.

Widely considered one of the crowning achievements of literary history, transcending time and place, Joyce's *Uly*sses, still captures the imaginations of devoted readers who uphold the annual tradition of celebrating Bloomsday (named for the novel's central characters, Leopold and his wife, Molly Bloom) on June 16th with costumes, festivals, performances, and readings of the beloved novel in Ireland and abroad.


Hit The Road, Jack!



A signed first edition hardcover of Jack Kerouac's On the Road, offered by The Book Collector's Library is in very good or better condition, available for \$28,750 through Ageless Literature. This remarkable volume merits a place of honor among revered works of American autobiographical fiction, captivating travel narratives, and insightful studies of 1950s counterculture.

Penned in 1951 by the Founding Father of "the Beat Generation", Kerouac's novel, On the Road, published in 1957, catapulted Kerouac to fame and inspired a broad swath of culture makers and literature students captivated by his radical exploration of American values and man's perpetual search for meaning.

Kerouac used *On the Road* as a vehicle for cataloging his cross-country adventures and exploits, and those of his larger-than-life counterpart, and fellow Beat writer, Neal Cassady, immortalized as the ebullient character, Dean Moriarty.



Kerouac fashioned the narrator, Sal Paradise, after himself, and in doing so, created one of the key texts essential to understanding the postwar American spirit and the creative landscape of the late 1950s. His free-form prose evokes the vitality and creative license celebrated by jazz musicians of the era, like Miles Davis, and painters like Jackson Pollock, and distills it into several hundred pages of requisite reading, typed on a continuous sheet of paper over three weeks in April 1951. You now have the opportunity to own the text in its first edition released to the public and signed by the legendary author.

Tolkien shares the origin of the name "Bag-End", which refers to Frodo and Bilbo Baggins' house, brave cousins and two of the most cherished characters in Tolkien's ever-popular fantasy series, The Lord of the Rings—and indeed, in all of literature. Tolkien reveals to Jackson that the Baggins' house-name originated from a nickname locals gave to his aunt Jane's English farmhouse located at the end of a lane in Dormston in Worcestershire (near Evesham). Tolkien playfully laments that "... (however unfair it may seem) it is impossible to patent mere names..."




A Prívate Correspondence Between Two Legends

14 letters from Lawrence Durrell to Henry Miller

British novelist and poet, Lawrence Durrell, and brother of influential naturalist Gerald Durrell initiated a fruitful and enduring friendship with writer Henry Miller after reading Tropic of Cancer and mailing a letter to Miller, noting the novel's profound impact on his personal and professional development. Miller responded to Durrell with genuine interest and thus began a years-long correspondence with his fellow writer and expat.







Their correspondence includes this spectacular collection of 14 letters, 13 typed and one handwritten, from Lawrence Durrell to Henry Miller, largely written between 1975 and 1979, and primarily sent by Durrell from Sommières, a commune in southern France to Miller's residence in southern California.

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The intimate details of Durrell's daily life in France, so colorfully chronicled in these private letters to Miller demonstrate the closeness of his friendship with Miller and transform the minutiae of everyday existence into a rousing series of letters that would satisfy any serious book collector's deepest curiosity.

Marceau, Miller, & Musings

In 1973, the incomparable French actor, artist, and mime, Marcel Marceau wrote an impassioned, playfully illustrated, and personally autographed 13-page letter to Tropic of Cancer author, Henry Miller expressing his desire for a film adaptation of Miller's 1959 novella about a famous clown, Auguste's search for meaning, The Smile at the Foot of the Ladder.

Like Auguste, Marceau knew deep grief and courageously chose a joyous vocation. As a Jewish clown and actor living in France, Marceau saved at least seventy Jewish children during WWII, helping them escape occupied France and the horrors of the Holocaust by leading them to safety in neutral Sweden. Using his exceptional skills of mimicry to distract and calm the children and keep them quiet during their dangerous journey to safety, Marceau, with this humble act of heroism, created space for joy and laughter in the lives of children exposed to humanity's most harrowing conditions.



Marceau's father was murdered in the notorious Auschwitz concentration camp in 1944. This immense tragedy and others informed his work and outlook on life and created his unique blend of vulnerability as a radical act and joy as a form of resistance.


In Miller, Marceau saw a man who adventured into unknown territory and fearlessly blazed a path for others. Despite the obvious differences in their chosen mediums of expression—a writer lives by words; a mime uses none—it's not difficult to see why Marceau felt powerfully drawn to Miller's thought-provoking and unexpectedly spiritual work and wrote to him to propose their collaboration on a film adaptation of The Smile at the Foot of the Ladder.



Challenging Laws

As Miller exhorted in Tropic of Cancer, "I believe that today more than ever a book should be sought after even if it has only one great page in it. We must search for fragments, splinters, toenails, anything that has ore in it, anything that is capable of resuscitating the body and the soul." Miller's provocative tour de force breathed new life into the dustiest corners of the stodgiest libraries and galvanized inventive writers like Lawrence Durrell to stand up and be heard.

Originally published in Paris, France in 1934, Miller's Tropic of Cancer, an account of a young writer's experiences in Paris was banned in the U.S. due to the book's sexually explicit nature. In a landmark case, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled 5-4 in favor of Miller's book after a 1964 printing of the book sparked obscenity trials. The Supreme Court recognized the literary merit and cultural significance of Miller's ribald novel and thus set a new precedent for freedom of the press in the era of free love and the sexual revolution.



KASPER STURM'S HISTORY OF THE WORLD

German-born Kasper Sturm, a 16th century historian, law student, imperial herald and associate of Martin Luther, the theologian at the helm of the Protestant Reformation, reported on politics and major events to the Nuremberg Council.



During his tenure, he studied the Nuremberg Chronicle, an illustrated encyclopedia of secular and biblical history. This work, *Die Kleyn Furstlich Chronica*, *published in 1544 by Kasper Sturm*, offers a detailed historical account from the beginning of time to the fall of the Roman Empire, featuring *over 30 illustrated pages with portraits of notable figures like Julius Caesar and Jesus Christ.*With only one known private copy still in existence, Sturm's History of the World, an erudite labor of love inspired by his fascination with the Nuremberg Chronicle, is exceedingly rare and extremely valuable from both a historical and literary perspective.



This extraordinary tome is one of the last surviving editions of a remarkable book, that has been beautifully preserved for more than 480 years. Its exquisite rebinding features a rare antiphonary leaf from the 1600s, showcasing the meticulous craftsmanship of its time. This poem has been for many years known to English readers as one of the most exquisite fruits of Oriental genius. Mr. Vedder has for the last ten years studied the poem with a view to illustration, and his peculiar characteristics as an artist fit him especially for this work. The designs which he has made for the volume have a power and dignity of conception hitherto almost unknown to American art.

There are fifty-six of these designs, in which are incorporated the one hundred and one stanzas given in Fitzgerald's translation of the poem. The drawings are reproduced in fac-simile, and as the method used admits of printing in any desired color, the results are nearer the original designs in every respect than could be secured by any other known method. 



Instead, it includes blank pages in between, where the first editions would have been bound together, a striking feature that underscores its unique pre-publication status. This copy also boasts an extraordinary provenance, having belonged to Vedder himself and remaining within his family for over 140 years before entering the rare book market. In excellent condition, the book features clean, bright pages and retains its original integrity. The additional loose advertisement sheet further cements its rarity as a tangible link to the work's release and reception.





This finely bound volume features *The Pickwick Papers*, Charles Dickens' groundbreaking first novel, meticulously preserving the original first appearances of each serialized issue together in one elegant presentation. Illustrated with 43 plates throughout and in fine condition, this exceptional volume offers a rare opportunity to own a definitive piece of literary history.

Originally published in monthly installments, *The Pickwick Papers* catapulted Dickens from an obscure journalist to England's most celebrated author virtually overnight. The first installment, released in April 1836 in an edition of just 1,000 copies, garnered modest attention. However, the introduction of the beloved character Sam Weller in chapter 10, released as part of the fourth installment in July 1836, transformed the series into a publishing phenomenon. Demand surged, prompting the publishers to reprint earlier installments to satisfy the growing audience.





By the time the work was issued in book form in November 1837, numerous textual corrections had been made. Collectors often grapple with the intricate and varied textual points tied to the original parts, as a "perfect" set with all such points is effectively unattainable in the book format.

The serialization was initially conceived as a showcase for the illustrations of Robert Seymour, whose tragic death by suicide after the first issue necessitated a swift replacement. Robert William Buss briefly assumed the role but proved unsuited to steel engraving. The position eventually fell to Hablot Knight Browne ("Phiz"), who became Dickens' principal collaborator for the next twenty years, cementing an enduring creative partnership.

Elegantly bound in octavo format (210 x 122 mm), this volume not only preserves Dickens' literary debut but also features stunning original illustrations that bring the story to life. A fine copy, it serves as both a testament to the serialized origins of Dickens' genius and a remarkable collector's piece.



The playful inscription reads:
"Mrs. Shaw / with warm regards / HGW / and do make GBS try a novel."
This remark playfully nods to an earlier exchange in which Shaw had encouraged Wells to try his hand at writing a play.



More romantic reminiscence than science fiction, Wells' bread and butter, *The Passionate Friends* explores first love, lost and found, and lost again, and the inevitability of change as youthful idealism gives way to the harsh realities of adulthood. Wells' intriguing departure from the science fiction he's so strongly associated with, coupled with the personalized and jocular inscription, instructing Shaw to "try a novel", offers thrilling insight into the literary meeting of the sharp and socially curious minds of Wells and Shaw.


Wells and Shaw had a dynamic personal and professional relationship which inspired some of the most groundbreaking work and social commentary of the twentieth century. Wells and Shaw, united in their passionate intellectual pursuits, commitment to socialist ideology (as evidenced by their mutual involvement in the politically active Fabian Society), and tireless ambition to change the world by changing minds, maintained an unequalled exchange of letters and ideas for at least forty-five years, despite vastly different temperaments and an enduringly argumentative and teasing, yet friendly rivalry.



This volume contains four plates of illustration and 240 pages, along with 42 pages of prefatory material and an additional 8 pages of supplementary content.

Its scarcity is underscored by its limited archival presence; WorldCat lists just one extant copy, held at the Bibliothèque Nationale de France and traced back to Roland Bonaparte's library.

In terms of condition, this 32mo volume is remarkably well-preserved. The binding exhibits minor rubbing and light wear to the hinges and corners, consistent with its age, while the interior pages show some foxing throughout.

Despite these signs of gentle wear, the volume remains in very good condition, a testament to its careful preservation over the centuries. An extraordinary collectible, this almanac offers a tangible connection to Napoleon's legacy, his extraordinary rise and fall, and the enduring allure of his complex and controversial story.


Journal of the Voyages and Travels of a Corps of Discovery



Nearly 20 years ago, a first edition of *Journal of the Voyages and Travels of a Corps of Discovery* by Patrick Gass, from the renowned library of Frank Streeter sold at auction for \$45,600—far exceeding its estimate of \$5,000 to \$7,000. Frank Streeter, a prominent collector of exploration literature, assembled an extraordinary library focused on pivotal works of discovery and navigation, making this sale a testament to the book's historical and bibliographic significance.

This earliest published firsthand account of the Lewis and Clark expedition, predating the official report by seven years, cemented Patrick Gass's legacy as one of the most notable members of the Corps of Discovery. His critical role as sergeant, frequent mentions in the journals of Lewis and Clark, and distinction as the first to publish an account of the expedition, contributed to his enduring recognition. Gass also coined the term "Corps of Discovery," now synonymous with the historic journey. Widely regarded as "one of the essential books for an Americana collection" (Streeter), this work remains a cornerstone of early American exploration literature.

Published in Pittsburgh by Zadok Cramer for David M'Keehan in 1807, the book is bound in contemporary marbled boards with a rebacked calf spine, gilt-lettered (pp. viii, [9]-262).






The binding is firm but shows wear, with rubbed edges and repairs to the front endpaper and title page corners. Owner inscriptions and a presumed catalog number appear on the front pastedown and page iii, respectively. Pages are toned, with occasional dampstaining and foxing, most prominent in the opening sections. Despite these flaws, this first edition remains scarce and highly collectible, offering an authentic and vivid account of one of America's most celebrated explorations.

A signed early printing of J.D. Salinger's *The Catcher in the Rye listed by The Book Collector's Library on Ageless Literature for \$55,000* is perhaps even more elusive than the notoriously private author himself-dodging press interviews and photo ops after the 1953 publication and subsequent success of his only novel. An Army veteran who served in WWII only a few years before chronicling the misadventures and musings of his young and disillusioned protagonist, Holden Caulfield, Salinger only published a few collections of short stories and declined every opportunity for self-promotion.

Like Caulfield, Salinger refused societal expectations and the hopes of publishers, journalists, filmmakers, and devotees of his writings. The back of the dust jacket of this signed early printing of *The Catcher in the Rye* bears nine reviews in lieu of a headshot, at the enigmatic author's behest. An exceedingly rare signed first edition, notably bearing Salinger's youthful nickname "Sonny" appeared for sale in 2022 at a rare book fair in London, with an asking price of \$228,000.



While *The Catcher in the Rye* is Salinger's only published novel, its influence on American youth, popular culture, and media cannot be overstated. The novel's overarching themes of innocence lost, the loneliness of growing up, and the emotional fortitude it requires to stand apart from society, and remain steadfast in your ideals, at great personal cost, are accessible and evergreen conversation starters that invite readers to reflect and respond to Salinger's text with their own existential questions and personal challenges. As controversial as it is celebrated, *The Catcher in the Rye* is a frequently banned book due to the profanity and sexual references peppered throughout the text, as well as Caulfield's anti-authoritarian attitude, which critics viewed as a negative influence on impressionable young readers.

Salinger's novel was infamously carried and cited by Mark David Chapman, the man who murdered British musician, John Lennon of the Beatles outside of his Manhattan apartment in 1980. Chapman was reportedly leafing through a copy of the novel when police arrived on the scene. Chapman aligned with Caulfield's obsession with "phonies" (insincere people who are more concerned with status than sincerity) as a motive for targeting Lennon who he viewed as egotistical and hypocritical. Undeniably, The Catcher in the Rye holds a powerful place in American history, with a cultural impact that far surpasses debates over its literary merit or moral implications. A perennial conversation starter, this iconic novel is sure to bring intrigue and depth to any rare book collection.







